From Our Pastors

Church Disrupted

Because it is Pentecost, sometimes referred to as “the birthday of the church”, perhaps it is good to look at the Pentecost narrative in comparison with our present church. Few of our churches have problems with doors being blown off hinges, rushing wind, and tongues of fire – phenomena that happened in First Church Jerusalem. Our worship services are not normally interrupted by people suddenly speaking German, or Ukrainian or Chinese for the sake of those attending so that they hear the Gospel in languages they understand.

In Acts 2 we have such a report of a church meeting. Well, they did not know they were at a church meeting, they thought they were there to celebrate a historic festival – the giving of the first five books of the Bible. Someone may have remarked that there were not as many people as last year. “Well, we’ve got Jews from every nation under heaven,” was the response. “*Medes, Elamites, Persians, residents of Cappadocia*”. That pretty much covers the map. Even though we are all about the same age, we have some wonderful geographical diversity!”

To those people, settling in to plod through the agenda much like they had the year before, suddenly there was the rush of a mighty wind and fire, and people speaking strange languages that disrupted their normally sedate proceedings. The Holy Spirit disrupted their well – organized agenda.

Lately the “normal” way we do church has been disrupted. We have learned to stay home; we have had to learn how to do video services which are then posted on the internet. We are communicating by Zoom and YouTube.

We certainly do not claim that the Covid19 pandemic is the work of the Holy Spirit!! If someone claims that – you do well to put a lot of “social distance” between them and yourself!

Yet if we were to consider these things in the light of Pentecost, God does not leave us to our own devices. The Holy Spirit continues to “call, gather, enlighten and sanctify” the church – through Word and Sacrament, and sometimes through wind and fire.

Church is a place that normally values tradition, continuity, and good order. Most of us come to church to be at peace. Most worship attenders treasure serenity and quiet. But sometimes there is the sound of wind, the place lights up, and our quiet orderly gathering is disrupted by a power that descends upon us, and takes us somewhere we had no intention of going. The thing that keeps church interesting, is the possibility of periodic disruption by the Holy Spirit.

The Covid19 pandemic will very likely disrupt our normal way that we do things in many areas of our life for some time to come. We cannot expect that things will simply return to “normal” and go back to the way things were before. In this time after Pentecost, and after the time of the pandemic, will we be open to the possibility that the Holy Spirit may be calling us to be the church in some different ways? Instead of mourning what we have lost, perhaps we might look for the blessings and opportunity this season provides us. If we devote ourselves to prayer and discernment, perhaps God may guide us into a future we never could have imagined without the pandemic.

Dear Beloved of God – I know I have said it before, but it bears repeating: I have experienced in these past weeks so many signs of hope, and of faithfulness, trust, courage, and encouragement:

- congregational leaders, lay and rostered who, under extraordinary stress, pressure and restraints have poured themselves into the work of leadership;
- congregational leaders, lay and rostered who, tired and weary and wondering, have reached out to one another, and to those in their midst, providing pastoral care, connection, compassion and care;
- congregational leaders, lay and rostered who, in the midst of an unprecedented time, exercised great skill (and energy and time) in preparing and/or searching for worship resources;
- rostered ministers who gather each Wednesday via ZOOM with Synod Staff for prayer, affirmation and encouragement, updates, and connecting;
- Area Deans who gather with rostered ministers via ZOOM for check-in with each other, study and/or prayer;
- and, creativity, ingenuity, openness, support, encouragement, trust, community.


At this time, I am inviting you – encouraging you – to pray for rostered ministers in varied ministry contexts, because I am hearing, seeing and recognizing that many of our rostered ministers are tired, weary, exhausted from:

- the emotional toll of being a leader in a time of uncertainty, crisis, liminality;
- leading sudden adaptive changes with technical challenges;
- disruption and change to regular patterns of spiritual and self-care practices;
- constant remote availability;
- worship preparation, pastoral care ministry, connecting with the congregation and community;
- and all, without any specific training or experience. This means that the skills, experience, training, networking, resourcing, and best practices, for many, have all needed to be created and learned in real time.

Pray for rostered ministers. Encourage them. Affirm their ministry. Give thanks. And know that God is with you and even now is planning and nourishing seeds of resurrection life.

Notes from Nadine



“The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear?
The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?”
Psalm 27, verse 1 (Words to be sung, most likely, as for the whole psalm)

If you have ever physically been somewhere with absolute pitch darkness about you for any length of time, and then been given light through some means to see a bit around you, you might recall the vividness and ‘revelation’ of that onset of light. The stark contrast between darkness and light is quite striking and memorable.

I visited the Philippines for two weeks in April of 1999 (their hottest month btw!) with a group of a dozen people from our Filipino Fellowship at a big Pentecostal Church in Vancouver. Right out of the airport near Manila I could feel the extreme humidity and ‘close-ness’ around me. It was daylight then, but as our jeepney driver kept travelling for hours, evening and night fell. We were heading for the tiny village of our pastor’s wife, where we would stay for the first few days with her family. I had no clue of what to expect.

The driver knew the way, though blackness surrounded us, and there were no street lights or signs for the last hour or two of the journey. In a jeepney the passengers sit on long benches under the windows, from the driver’s end down to the rear – so you constantly look out the other side of the bus, not out front, as the driver sees. Finally, we stopped in a cement square, the only light, coming from the jeepney headlights, showing us edges of some low clay or cement buildings and doorways. We unloaded our bags, and waited in the midnight stillness.

Suddenly through some trees and bushes at one corner, Nora’s brothers appeared with flaming torches held high. We could see their faces glowing in the light. They spaced themselves among us, and with bags in hand, we followed their lead along the narrow, raised paths through the family rice fields to the house. A few of us slipped off the side of the path and landed in the muddy, moist ground beside. Without their torches, we never would have arrived at the humble family dwelling, whose few electric light bulbs were lit through a generator. Our adventure had begun!

Forever I will remember the sight of those waving torches appearing out of the pitch black, that guided us along completely unknown paths one step at a time in a foreign (to me) land. We weren’t fearful, because we trusted our guides, and knew well those who had led us here. ... But it WAS very different, and over the next weeks I became ‘painfully aware’ of how inflexible I was. In our outreach events and worship services many, many twists and turns, sudden changes in plans, and failed and foiled attempts occurred, and the frustrations I felt and expressed did nothing to help those situations. But they showed ME ‘where I was at’: some deep-seated things that I did not know about myself.

As long as we are on this earth, God has plans for us. “His ways are not our ways”, Isaiah 55 says. “He is the Potter; we are the clay” (Isaiah 64:8). If we are willing, He will use these unexpected (to us) times to change and (re)shape us – for good, and not for evil.

Psalm 27 ends with: “...be strong and TAKE HEART, and wait for the Lord”. Jesus’ beloved friend John says about him: “The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.” (Nor can it!) God will NEVER abandon us (Joshua 1:5).

Be encouraged today, and share encouragement. Thank you for your encouragement of me! We can all SING in the darkness, as we wait for more light! (...playing piano is harder, but we can sing! lol!)

- **First Contact** is being broadcast again. There are three episodes, each around one hour in length.
 - It is an informative documentary which gives insight into contemporary Indigenous life and culture.
- Many Canadians' opinions about the Indigenous people of this country are formed without knowledge of the culture's true history or firsthand experience of the present-day communities.

First Contact takes six Canadians on a 28- day journey intended to challenge these attitudes and shed a light on the true Indigenous experience. The travelers, all with uninformed views about Indigenous People, have been invited to leave their everyday lives behind and embark on a unique journey, travelling deep into the Indigenous communities throughout Canada including the nation's capital, Algonquin Anishanabek Territory, Labrador, Saskatchewan, Alberta and the Yukon. It is a journey that will challenge their perceptions and confront their prejudices about a world they never imagined they would see. This exploration of the true Indigenous experience in Canada will change the participants' lives forever.

Dear friends of Kuriakos: These are dark times. Last week, the province's official Relaunch Strategy announcement made it clear that our regular on-site summer camps, with large groups gathering in the dining hall and around the campfire, will probably not be possible during the summer of 2020. To comply with government requirements, Kuriakos' Board of Directors has made the difficult decision to suspend our planned on-site camp programs, retreats, and rental group activities.

We feel sad when we think about the great things that would have happened at Kuriakos and now will not: kids of all ages learning practical skills, making lifelong friends, and coming to know the love of Christ from our capable and enthusiastic staff. Perhaps you, too, feel this loss as yet another hardship imposed by the isolation required during the COVID-19 pandemic.

But the light of Kuriakos will not be extinguished. The Board is listening carefully to how God is calling us to be light to the world this summer. The ministry of Kuriakos will continue — though we aren't yet sure exactly what it will look like. Our summer staff have been training online with the knowledge that their service this summer will be different than it would in a regular year. The success of the online Women's Retreat with Rev. Bev Swanson in April offers one possible model for future programs. Other promising ideas have also been proposed. Stay tuned!

TIME AFTER PENTECOST

Faith Story by Jeane Webb

My Journey of FAITH..... written March 26, 2020

.....really begins with my Great Grandmother, Mary Sheraton Barton Robson, born in Durham County England, May 17, 1862. Her life and story have been the guide posts in my life and faith Journey. Mary was an only child, home educated, daughter of a Blacksmith, the only person in their Village who could read. Mary grew up a strong woman, wed to two husbands, both losing their lives to double pneumonia as Games Keepers in the north of England. Mary was Mother to 14 children from these marriages. She became a mid-wife, wet nurse and some said, a healer in those times of little medicine. She proclaimed herself a Servant of the Lord and went forth with a strong Faith in her God and the strength He would give her.

Left a widow and fearing for the future for her sons in the coal mines and following the grim days following WW One, Mary set sail and emigrated to Canada in 1919. Two of her grown children had gone ahead, found land and had taken out Homesteads south of Killam and Strome. My Grandfather, her eldest child, had already established a pioneer home south of Killam. Six more of Mary's children were to follow. The others stayed in England, all adults now and on their own making their own choices. Thus we had family on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean.

And so, I was born into that grand band of hearty, pioneer Christian people led by Mary the Martiach and Servant of the Lord. You could say that I was born into the Faith for which I am so thankful. I was Baptized into the Church of England (Anglican Communion) at 4 months of age at St. George's Anglican Church in Killam and Confirmed at St. George's at age 11, along with my older brother and our Mother whom we had taken away from the Baptists and made "one of us". I'm not sure she ever forgave us! But, she became a Life Member of the ACW!

I was blessed my whole life through in this very large family community. We multiplied and grew into an ever larger family network. I was blessed in my immediate family of 5, mother, father, older brother and younger sister. We lived through a lot of hardship but we children didn't really ever know how poor we were, how hard the years of the depression and WW2 were for our families because they all soldiered on, made the most of even the hard times and kept firm in the Faith of the Fathers.

My siblings and I were blessed with getting good educations. We all attended University. I became a Teacher, had the benefit of music lessons from the age of 7 and those things shaped my Adult life. Our lives as children and young people centered around our farm families and the Church.

It seems that God placed all of the right people in my life and still does! I came to Red Deer in 1959 after teaching 3 years at Sedgewick in the Killam School Division. The Baby Boom years were on. I was assigned to Mountview Elementary School and there I met a dear Staff Member who was to become my cherished friend & mentor AND she was an Anglican and Member of St. Luke's Church. I was introduced to that Congregation and became a Member. St. Luke's needed an Organist! I had grown up in the music and the Liturgy of the Church and had advanced my piano skills at University and in private lessons on the organ. Guess what? Within 6 months of attending St. Luke's I was "on the bench" and in the Choir Stalls where I would remain for almost 30 years. Every year and all the memories are so precious to me. The large St. Luke's window facing onto Gaetz Ave was placed in memory of the dear friend who took me to St. Luke's so long ago.

Life was so good! I met and married my first husband, (Irish Catholic but I converted him). Our two girls were born and we enjoyed wonderful years as a family, I had good years in the classroom and was very involved in our Church. BUT, life is not without its trials and tribulations and the next 20 years of my life my Faith was to be sorely tested. My first husband died 34 years ago after a most dreadful death by pancreatic cancer. I lived through 4 sad and lonely years supported by family, friends and my Church. I was clinging to the Faith Mary had passed down to me through her example .

I married my second husband at St. Luke's in 1990. The whole Church rejoiced with us, the Choir Director and a tenor in the Choir! WE had 15 years together before he was to endure a 3 year battle with pulmonary fibrosis, spending the last year of his life with 8 months in the Hospital and passing away at the Hospice just days before our 18th Anniversary.

These were such hard years, no words to describe it. I came to Good Shepherd 10 years ago, Lost, lonely, struggling to make a life alone once again. The rest is history. I met my dear beloved Donald Christian Nielsen, both of us in great need of a companion, friend & supporter of life's curves. We married at Good Shepherd in a quiet, little late afternoon Ceremony conducted by Pastor Rolf Nosterud with dear Grace as ring bearer. We celebrated our 9th Wedding Anniversary this past November. Don & I believe that our God brought us together. We share a strong FAITH in HIM.

I DID NOT EVER WALK MY FAITH JOURNEY ALONE. OVER THE YEARS at my family Church in Killam, my years at St. Luke's and St. Leonard's I was inspired and shown the way by so many inspirational people in the Congregations and the Ministry.

I want to acknowledge and tell the names of the Ministers I worked with over the years here in Red Deer especially. For those of you who have lived long years in this city you might have known some of these dear people. I remember the Reverends: Randall Ivany; Murray Starr; Albert Collier; Archie McMullen; Gordon Dixon; Derek Hoskin; Gary Sinclair; Rilla Sommerville; and Rolf Nosterud. I had the honor and privilege of serving with them over the years of this most amazing & blessed life! Several of these have gone before us to the Heavenly Kingdom. God Bless their Souls .

If there was ever a time for FAITH, it must be now. Our world is gripped by a Pandemic Virus, and we are struggling with the breakdown of our societal structure. I believe that God is still there, caring and hurting for us and that He will deliver us from this storm. I rely on the Faith of our Fathers (and Great Grandmothers like Mary) to help us through.

Long ago I found a quote that has helped me through really hard times: " Faith is that little light in one's heart that keeps glowing even when the eyes can see only darkness."

Let's keep that light burning in this time of great challenges in our world. Christ is that Light.
