From Our Pastors

Walking into an Unknown Future

In Luke chapter 24 we read the story of the two disciples walking to Emmaus – a post resurrection story. As they walk, they were disillusioned, confused, and wondering what would come next. They had hoped that Jesus would be the one who would rescue the people of Israel. Instead their world had been thrown into turmoil. Suddenly, an unknown stranger appears and they converse together about all the things that have happened.

The feelings of these two disciples are not so different from what we are currently facing in this time - our world has been disrupted and changed dramatically. We are not able to gather publicly for worship; social distancing is the norm. All this to “flatten the curve” in the hopes that we can prevent overburdening the Health Care System.

What is most challenging for your pastors is how to provide ministry when we cannot meet together. It seems ironic to us that just at the time when our interim ministry is coming to an end that we are separated from each other.

Which brings us to the question we are all asking: When can we return to normal? For the foreseeable future, worship together is going to be similar to what we are doing now. So, what will this mean for the future of our churches? No one knows. We hope and pray that the experience of not being able to gather together will help us realize how much we need the community of faith. This could be a turning point when people who are church members but worship only infrequently, will realize that we need the strength that comes from corporate worship. We pray that our congregations will come together after the pandemic stronger and even more vital than before.

To return to the experience of the disciples on the Emmaus road, when they sit down at table together, a curious thing happens. The unknown stranger is revealed to them when he “took the bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them.” It is in that act that the disciples recognize the stranger as Christ. The disciples have now experienced Christ in word (interpreting the Scriptures) and sacrament (the breaking of the bread).

That transforming event changed them. By the time they reach the end of their journey, they moved from discouragement and despair to hope and faith. They immediately return to Jerusalem to share their experience with the other disciples.

The story resonates with a sense of the power of the Word and Sacraments to connect us with God's presence. Wherever your Emmaus might be, your home, your place of work, your school, where you play, the assurance that we have is that God will walk with us.

The bias of your pastors is that we will continue to need the human connection that comes from gathering, and sharing the Word and Sacrament together. We are walking into an unknown future, yet we are promised that Jesus continues to journey with us.

From Bishop Larry

May 2020 Message for Congregations and Lay and Rostered Leaders

Dear Beloved of God –

Christ is risen. Alleluia!

You may recall in my correspondence this year for congregational AGM's these words:

“Since being called to serve as your bishop, October 2012, my prayer has often been the following: O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go forward with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

One of the reasons I love this prayer is because it is realistic but encouraging, honest but hopeful. It doesn't deny difficult truths, but neither does it succumb to sterile pessimism. It was written in the first part of the twentieth century by a Church of England priest named Eric Milner-White. Like many good prayers from another time and place, it sounds like it was tailor made for us here and now.”

Little did I know the future when I first penned these words last December.

The prayer is realistic, encouraging, honest, hopeful, no denying of difficult truths nor succumbing to sterile pessimism. The prayer continues to be ‘tailor made’ for us here and now. The Spirit of God continues to lead us into a future that is unfamiliar, with the assurance that God is present, that God's hand is leading us, and that we are cradled in love.

Friends, you continue to be witnesses to me of Resurrection, to the truth that there is life and hope and promise.

I have experienced in these past weeks so many signs of hope, and of faithfulness, trust, courage, and encouragement:

- Congregational leaders, lay and rostered who, under extraordinary stress, pressure and restraints have poured themselves into the work of leadership
- Congregational leaders, lay and rostered who, tired and weary and wondering, have reached out to one another, and to those in their midst, providing pastoral care, connection, compassion and care
- Congregational leaders, lay and rostered who, in the midst of an unprecedented time, exercised great skill (and energy and time) in preparing and/or searching for worship

- Rostered Ministers who gather each Wednesday via ZOOM with Synod Staff for prayer, affirmation and encouragement, updates, and connecting

- Creativity, ingenuity, openness, support, encouragement, trust, community....

Friends, you have been signs to me of Resurrection life. And, I have never been so proud of you. Alleluia. Christ is risen, indeed!

TIME AFTER PENTECOST

Faith Story by Tom Marstaller

My dad was a pastor's kid so I was fortunate to grow up in a church family. My parents were new Canadians so the church was not only our family of faith but became our extended family as well. I was baptized at Our Saviour's Lutheran Church in Winnipeg when I was 3 months old.

It is difficult to pinpoint a specific time when God became more than a name for me, but I know that it happened while attending summer camp at Luther Village. This camp became a second home to me while growing up. The combination of being in creation and the laid-back atmosphere of a Christian camp community made it easy to understand the wonder of God's gifts.

There have been a great many people and events that have influenced my faith. One that sticks out in particular occurred when I was 11 and had gone to visit family in Germany with my sister. On the first day of our 6-week trip I got into a biking accident, broke my jaw in 3 places and ended up with my jaw wired shut. My Aunt Hilde, my Uncle Helmut and my cousins set a strong example of what true faith and hospitality look like. No matter troubles we had to get through to get me healthy and back to Canada, their belief that God was going to make everything come out alright was very calming. Their example has stayed with me and I wish I could live up to the standard that they have set.

During my journey of faith there have been times that I have felt distant from God, not because I felt that God had left me but because I believed that I could go through my struggle without God's help. Hubris can outweigh good sense. After moving to Calgary for work I was left in a strange city with few friends, I began attending All Saint's with the intention of meeting new people. Little

did I know then all the great things that God had in store for me. Several of the ladies in the congregation worked to set me up with a young lady from the church community. I am so very blessed that the young lady was Christine and we have been together ever since.

Returning to the biking theme, long distance cycling is a passion of mine. The solitude and beauty of the road provides the perfect opportunity to contemplate one's faith and place in the world. Breaking my jaw is not the only accident I have sustained while cycling, in 2017 I had a severe concussion while cycling. During my recovery I experienced significant dizziness, terrible headaches as well as bouts of anxiety and depression. While parts of my recovery have felt painfully slow my faith has been a great help. Throughout all of it I knew that God was with me as I worked towards recovery. No matter how bad things were I knew God was with me on my journey to recovery. I'm hoping to be back out on the road this summer on my bike but we'll see what God has in store for me.
